Garden Calendar

November: Start planting spring flowering bulbs such as daffodils.

Apply winter mulch around tender plants before first frost.

A great time to complete a final weeding of your perennial beds is after your perennials have died back to the ground.

Water broad leaved evergreens every two weeks until the ground is frozen. The last two winters we've seen major desiccation damage to broad leaved evergreens like Holly and Boxwood because they had less than adequate moisture before the ground froze.

Protect your broad leaved evergreens from winter desiccation by applying an anti-transpirant.

Begin spraying plant material prone to deer browsing with a repellent. Repellex is a good choice.

Wrap any plant prone to snow or animal damage with netting/burlap.

Cut back perennials if they are not going to provide winter interest.


December: Bring in garden hoses.

Put a gas stabilizer in power equipment and run for 10 minutes or run the tank dry. Change spark plug, oil and filters.

Re-apply deer repellents and anti-transpirants every 2 months when temperatures are above 40 degrees.



Without generous amounts of water this fall, winter desiccation will be a real problem this coming spring as it was in the spring of 2005.

I'd like to thank our clients for the best summer and fall we've ever had. Without you it would not have been possible.

Chasing the dream

I was intrigued. The more I listened to Mr. Steele the more I wanted to know. It seemed like a nice way to make a living.

Mr. Steele was obviously extremely successful at what he did. That one day has had such an influence on my life.

What I saw through my young eyes was a man on a

mission. The tour reinforced my decision to go on to obtaining a degree in Landscape Architecture.

Since meeting Mr. Steele, I've been chasing a similar dream of owning my own Bayberry. Living and working from one piece of property. Surrounding myself with the beautiful plants I love and sell to our clients.

First, came the purchase of ten acres of neglected land in New Milford in 1995. I continue to clear and tame

had to dig a trench across the property to remove water from a water main break on a Sunday afternoon while digging footings for a foundation. Or the time we had to cut the roof off the fishing shack we decided to move to the property because it wouldn't fit under the power lines. Oh the stories I can tell or the pictures I could show you!

Well, after 12 years of hard work, dedication and perseverance our first plants went into the ground a couple of weeks ago.

A lot has happened over the years and much more will continue to take place before the property becomes the next Bayberry.

Overwhelmed is an understatement. Chasing the dream has been a strain emotionally and financially. Almost every weekend for 12 years has been spent working on our property. Many times I've felt like giving up for a simpler life but friends and family have intervened, giving me support and encouragement. Last time I thought about a simpler life, my friend Rich McKean said "follow through, you'll be bored and depressed if you give up the dream now" or my neighbor Michael Gold who simply said "you can't give up you're so close". I continue toward the dream because of one statement I heard shortly after meeting Mr. Steele. In a tape by Earl Nightingale titled The Strangest Secret I heard the line "Think and though shall you become". Live your dream and it will become reality. It's hard to imagine my goal will ever be totally complete. It took 18 years just to put a couple plants in the ground. Plants which might end up at your house some day.

There is something about the green industry that gets under your skin. No matter where I am, Europe, Australia, the Caribbean or the States I'm always trying to get into some private garden or searching out some nursery to visit. As I write this, I'm heading out the door
